WORK\$MART MOVES TO RUMFORD AVE

The Price Center has moved its **Work\$mart** Employment Placement Program to Rumford Ave., to share space with the administrative offices. **Work\$mart** is The Price Center's component based employment placement service for teens and adults with developmental disabilities. It is designed to allow the job seeker with a developmental disability to choose components of service that will best help him/her to obtain the right job.

The new professional environment will help **Work\$mart** better provide its continuum of services which include: Vocational Assessment, Career Planning, Job Targeted Education and Training, Job Development and Placement, and Ongoing and Interim Support.

The staff will help job seekers move quickly through the different components and help them identify and examine competitive work opportunities that are best suited for them. Personal interests, individual skill sets, and geographic location are all factors that our professionals help the job seeker to consider, as they set the course for their career pursuit.

Individuals who have a goal of group employment or volunteer work will still operate out of the Border St. site. Lori Harrington, Director of Employment Services, will oversee both sites.

A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Price Center Supporters,

I am pleased to announce that our recent survey done by the Commission for Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) has resulted in a three year certification which is the highest level that can be awarded. The surveyors commended The Price Center in a variety of areas ranging from program quality to administrative efficiency. They especially singled out the efforts The Price Center makes to solicit input from stakeholders such as individuals served, families, and funding sources. Congratulations to all the staff who worked so hard to achieve this positive result.

With the coming of spring it is nice to talk about a new initiative at The Price Center. In March we moved the placement component of our Employment Services Program over to the Administrative Offices on Rumford Ave. in Auburndale. The new site will offer a professional environment for individuals to prepare for placement in individual



community employment. The placement component will be called Work\$mart. Our assessment service and job developer will also move over with the program. We are excited by the chance to enhance our community employment service.

Another positive development has been the completion of the kitchen renovations at Humanity House. The kitchen has been totally renovated with new cabinets, appliances, and flooring. In addition, the widening of the door has made it possible for wheelchair access. We hope that the new kitchen will make it easier for staff to provide services to the residents at the house.

Although last year's budget resulted in significant cuts to our Day Habilitation and Residential programs, those cuts would have been much worse if not for the intense advocacy done by individuals, families, and organizations in the developmental disabilities community. This success demonstrates how important the advocacy we do is to keeping our services available. With the budget cuts proposed for the coming year in residential and employment services, we again have our work cut out for us, but the experience we gained last year should help us to be more effective going forward. Each of our programs will be scheduling their quarterly family meetings in the near future. At those meetings we will be trying to keep everyone informed of what the current budget situation is, although if it is like last year there will be an element of fluctuation. We also will be communicating by e-mail to make sure people are up to date. Thanks for your constant efforts in this endeavor.
