

The first time you meet Peter and Lucy Johnson, you see an immediate resemblance between them. Before they speak, their bright smiles and warm sparkling eyes greet you. Peter and his sister Lucy are great examples of people who care about members of our community. The Price Center has always prided itself on strong family connections and having Peter and Lucy here only reinforces that,” explains Tony Concannon, Director of the Day Habilitation program.

Peter, a participant in our Employment Services and Community Based Day programs is a loquacious young man who has Down Syndrome. Lori Harrington, the program director says: “Peter’s inspiring nature and positive energy is contagious. He brings the best out of everyone”.

Peter loves to speak publically about issues related to those with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD) and often stresses the need for more employment opportunities for the disabled. No stranger to working with the public, Peter worked at the State House where he did clerical work and was a tour guide before he came to The Price Center “to start something new.” His role model is Eunice Kennedy Shriver because “she did so much for our community. She never gave up on us.”

Peter grew up in Scituate where he attended a Life Skills Program at Scituate High School and a vocational program at The Friendship Home in Norwell, MA. During which time he worked as a teacher’s assistant helping students with Autism. If you ask Peter what he learned from his various work and volunteer experiences, he will tell you candidly that “Everyone wants to be loved, respected and treated fairly. We are special people and God made us all heroes so that we can educate others to believe that we can accomplish more and remember how important we are to the world.” He thinks it is important that individuals with IDD partner with each other because they can learn from each other how to overcome some of the challenges they all face. Now 29, Peter’s enthusiasm bubbles over when he speaks about how he is helping to mentor a 23 year old new participant, encouraging him to become more social.





Jon is especially impressed with the sensitivity that The Price Center professionals have for the individuals with whom they work. "And who knows? Perhaps when my daughter ages out of the public school system, she will be able to become a Price Center participant. I know that she is happy and she keeps surprising us with each new accomplishment."



**Kimberley A. Train**, CPA, AVB, Partner, Commercial Business Group, DiCicco, Gulman & Company LLP (DGC) was elected Treasurer to the Board in the fall. As Treasurer, "I believe in paying it forward. So using my accounting and finance skills in a non-profit setting is a way to give back."

Lucy never thought of her big brother as having a disability and shared many of Peter's friends. After Lucy earned a degree in art, she knew that she wanted to work with individuals with disabilities. According to their mother, Jane Johnson, "Lucy has always been kind, sensitive and accepting of all kinds of people. She is extremely patient and has great respect for people who are disabled. She has learned quite a lot since joining The Price Center because it has such a diverse population".



Tony explains, "Having Lucy working here has given all of us a greater understanding of our families."

Peter began attending The Price Center at 27. He raves about the programs, staff and

special family feeling he encounters each time he walks through the doors. As a result, Lucy applied and was hired to work as a case manager in the Day

Habilitation program where she is able to incorporate some of her personal interests into her job. Currently she supports the individuals by helping them with self-care activities, motor control and assists them to become more independent. Some of the individuals that Lucy assists are beginning to deal with aging which she notes can begin earlier in people with disabilities. Each day, Lucy tracks their progress and logs it into their records so that any changes can be addressed. Lucy's work keeps her quite busy, so she rarely has time to see Peter during the day but finds comfort in knowing that he is nearby. Peter has always been an inspiration to Lucy along with his peers. Lucy sees her brother as someone with great capabilities and beams with pride when she talks about his various

accomplishments.

Peter began working part-time last year at O'Hara's Irish Pub in Newton. He works hard and loves interacting with the customers there.

Jane explained that Peter always wanted to live independently. She and her husband were thrilled

when Peter found a residence in Newton Highlands nearby to his work and close to Lucy's apartment. A friend of Peter's who enjoyed living in Newton Highlands and was participating at The Price Center encouraged Peter to check it out. Jane noted that "We were very impressed by the caring and respectful manner of The Price Center staff. Everyone was very professional. We are so proud of the transition that Peter made and give credit to The Price Center. We knew immediately when Peter became engaged there that he was happy and were so proud of him for getting his job (on his own) at O'Hara's."

This year, Peter will be travelling to Washington, D.C. for the first time with a group from the Massachusetts Downs Syndrome Congress and will be participating in the 2017 Buddy Walk. Peter is excited about this new opportunity because he enjoys meeting people and hopes one day to become a spokesperson that will enable him to promote a better mind set about people with Down Syndrome and others types of IDD.



Although Peter and Lucy have different roles at The Price Center, both agree that they hope that someday soon individuals will be defined and measured by their ability and not by their disability.

## THANKS FOR 17 GREAT YEARS!

Dan Schwartz will be missed now that he has retired. "The Price Center is truly a special place. I learned a lot from the individuals I worked with and hope that they learned a lot from me." Dan knew when he came to The Price Center that he made the right choice. He impacted the lives of over 80 individuals during his 17 years working in the Community-Based Day and Employment Services programs. According to Lori Harrington, Director of the Employment Services and Community-Based Day programs, "Dan's ability to develop relationships with the participants was over the top. He just knew how to connect with them which really helped him learn how best to support them!"

Dan had many roles here over his 17 years which included job coaching, working with and supporting paid and volunteer work crews to being the Human Rights Officer and leading the program's self-advocacy and men's groups. He takes pride in knowing that some of the individuals he's helped are still working in jobs that they enjoy which have given them self-respect. According to Dan, the most rewarding aspect of his work was "to see people grow and become more confident in doing their jobs." As a job coach, Dan was responsible for ensuring that each individual could do their job.

Over the years, Dan saw people evolve and become more flexible. They adjusted to change more easily and their work taught them to be adaptable enabling them to work with a variety of people. "This is such an important skill to have in the workplace." While Dan is no longer here on a daily basis he promised to come back and visit often.
