The Price Center: A Family Affair

When my sister Consetta was born, her skull didn't develop properly, so she never progressed cognitively past the age of two or three and never learned to speak. She was born blind in one eye and was diagnosed with cerebral palsy. She lived with our mother until she died and then with our aunt until she died, and Consetta took a turn for the worse. She became bedridden and very frail. I knew I was going to have to do something for her. About seven years ago, I flew out to Louisville, Kentucky, and brought her to Boston. Just like that. I had nothing in place. And, keep in mind, I had a job to go to everyday. I didn't know what I was going to do about her, but I knew that I'd find a way to rescue my sister.

Back in Boston, we started the search for a day program. We had an interview at The Price Center's Intensive Day Habilitation program in Dedham. From the first moment, I knew there was something special about this place. Before we left, they had Consetta out of her wheelchair and on her feet! These days, they have her taking steps at the parallel bars every day and even playing Wii. We all think it might be possible for her to walk one day, with a walker. "The Price Center has given Consetta a new life and made my life possible."

Every time I go to the Dedham day hab and see what they've been able to accomplish with Consetta, I have a reason to cry. She has gone from nothingshe couldn't walk, she couldn't talk-to getting onto her own two feet and walking. She's even communicating (tapping her head to say she's happy) and making her own meals with the help of some adaptive equipment. The Price Center has given Consetta a new life and made my life possible. She enjoys coming to the plays I direct at Roxbury Community College. And every morning, when that bus pulls up to take her to The Price Center, she's got a smile on her face and is ready to go. I wouldn't be where I am, doing what I'm doing without everyone at The Price Center doing what they do. Neither would my sister.

Happy New Year! As The Price Center enters its thirty-fourth year, we begin 2011 with resolutions and some excellent news.

After an exhaustive review of our residential

and employment services for relicensing this past December, the Massachusetts Department of Developmental Services awarded The Price Center the highest scores of all the agencies in our area. Reviewers wrote: "Since the last review, the agency has further evolved into a culture of dedication, professionalism, and cohesiveness."

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The Price Center received the maximum two-year license for its residential programs, which earned a 97 percent rating, and its employment programs, which aced the evaluation, earning a score of 100 percent. Coming on the heels of a full three-year reaccreditation (the maximum) by the Commission on the Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) in April, these results are further confirmation that we consistently deliver care of the highest quality and integrity.

In addition to these recent achievements, we continue to accomplish many of the goals set out in our three-year strategic plan. We have made significant strides in upgrading our communications. This newly redesigned newsletter is just one example of the improvements you'll see in 2011. Our plan is eventually to distribute the newsletter primarily electronically. Tony Concannon

What is day habilitation?

It is a comprehensive program of daytime care for people with diverse disabilities. Some of our clients require total assistance while others with milder cognitive limitations have difficulties with mobility, communication, or behavior. Our goal is to help our clients become as independent as their range of abilities will allow. We provide care and services that are as individualized as possible.

What do you wish more people understood about the work you do?

We support close to 100 individuals and just as many families, and those families also support us, which is important to making our staff—and ultimately our clients—successful. The work we do is rewarding work, but it can also be difficult and challenging. So we really value the support of and our close ties with our clients' families.



What makes The Price Center's Day Habilitation different from others?

Continuity of care. Our employees tend to stay with us. The average length of service here is eight years. In this field of work, that kind of longevity is pretty much unheard of. It means that our clients are working with people who really know them well. We are distinctive also in that we bring a lot of community engagement into the lives of our clients. We help them and encourage them to get out of the building and into the community—to go to lunch, to shop, to get their hair cut. And we can do this because our staff-to-client ratio is kept low, close to 1:2.

What's the biggest challenge you face?

We provide superior day hab care for individuals with moderate to severe disabilities. But with the state facing serious budget problems, our programs are threatened: a lot of what we do could go by the wayside. We're serving a very fragile population, and we are challenged by high levels of uncertainty: how will we pay for everything we want to do, continuing to provide consistently excellent individualized care?
